Weatherization Program:	<u> </u>

Gov. Kay Ivey has awarded grants totaling \$3.2 million to assist low-income, elderly, and disabled Alabama residents with weatherizing their homes to lower energy costs. Specifically, \$291,917 was allocated to Central Alabama Regional Planning and Development Commissions for residents within Shelby and a few neighboring counties. Shelby county has had 0 applicants, and the goal is 8.

I attached the cover letter, application, and informative brochure. The brochure gives more detail on who qualifies. Not everyone will be qualified, but word of mouth is crucial for a program like this! If anyone has any further questions, they can call me at 205-732-0538 or the Central Alabama Regional Planning and Development Commissions at 334-262-4300 ext. 217.

ADECA Grant:

On August 24th, we applied for an ADECA State Energy Program grant and we were awarded!

The City of Montevallo was awarded a \$34,000 grant from Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs (ADECA) from the U.S. Department of Energy. Montevallo applied to retrofit the lights in Parnell Memorial Library with LED. This was a collaborative effort with Library Director, Savanah Kitchens, Public Works Director, Kirk Hamby, and the Public works department staff. The grant will save the City \$10,000 on energy bills, reduce the library's energy consumption by 67,000 KwH. This will take Parnell Memorial Library from top energy user to third. This will be a great demonstration project for future retrofits and energy efficiency projects. This grant requires a \$6,800 (20%) match from the City.

I am recommending Council:

- Vote to accept the grant
- Vote for \$6,800 match to come out of library fund.



FLOOD DAMAGE PREVENTION ORDINANCE

City of Montevallo, Shelby County, Alabar Ordinance # 12142020 - 302 **APPENDIX 11**

ARTICLE 1

STATUTORY AUTHORIZATION, FINDINGS OF FACT, PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES

SECTION A STATUTORY AUTHORIZATION

The Legislature of the State of Alabama has in Title 11, Chapter 19, Sections 1-24, Chapter 45, Sections 1-11, Chapter 52, Sections 1-84, and Title 41, Chapter 9, Section 166 of the Code of Alabama, 1975, authorized local government units to adopt regulations designed to promote the public health, safety, and general welfare of its citizenry. Therefore, the Montevallo City Council, of Shelby County, Alabama, does ordain as follows:

SECTION B FINDINGS OF FACT

- (1) The flood hazard areas of the City of Montevallo, Shelby County, Alabama are subject to periodic inundation which results in loss of life and property, health and safety hazards, disruption of commerce and governmental services, extraordinary public expenditures for flood relief and protection, and impairment of the tax base, all of which adversely affect the public health, safety and general welfare.
- (2) These flood losses are caused by the occupancy in flood hazard areas of uses vulnerable to floods, which are inadequately elevated, flood proofed, or otherwise unprotected from flood damages, and by the cumulative effect of obstructions in floodplains causing increases in flood heights and velocities.

SECTION C STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

It is the purpose of this ordinance to promote the public health, safety and general welfare and to minimize public and private losses due to flood conditions in specific areas by provisions designed to:

- (1) require that uses vulnerable to floods, including facilities which serve such uses, be protected against flood damage at the time of initial construction;
- (2) restrict or prohibit uses which are dangerous to health, safety and property due to water or erosion hazards, or which increase flood heights, velocities, or erosion;
- (3) control filling, grading, dredging and other development which may increase flood damage or erosion;
- (4) prevent or regulate the construction of flood barriers which will unnaturally divert flood waters or which may increase flood hazards to other lands; and

(5) control the alteration of natural floodplains, stream channels, and natural protective barriers which are involved in the accommodation of flood waters.

SECTION D OBJECTIVES

The objectives of this ordinance are:

- (1) to protect human life and health;
- (2) to minimize damage to public facilities and utilities such as water and gas mains, electric, telephone and sewer lines, streets and bridges located in floodplains;
- (3) to help maintain a stable tax base by providing for the sound use and development of flood prone areas in such a manner as to minimize flood blight areas,
- (4) to minimize expenditure of public money for costly flood control projects;
- to minimize the need for rescue and relief efforts associated with flooding and generally undertaken at the expense of the general public;
- (6) to minimize prolonged business interruptions, and
- (7) to ensure that potential home buyers are notified that property is in a flood area.

ARTICLE 2 GENERAL PROVISIONS

<u>SECTION A</u> <u>LANDS TO WHICH THIS ORDINANCE APPLIES</u>

This ordinance shall apply to all Areas of Special Flood Hazard within the jurisdiction of the City of Montevallo, Shelby County, Alabama.

SECTION B BASIS FOR AREA OF SPECIAL FLOOD HAZARD

The Areas of Special Flood Hazard identified by the Federal Emergency Management Agency in its Flood Insurance Study (FIS), dated February 20, 2013, with accompanying maps and other supporting data and any revision thereto, are adopted by reference and declared a part of this ordinance. For those land areas acquired by a municipality through annexation, the current effective FIS and data for the City of Montevallo, Shelby County, Alabama are hereby adopted by reference. Areas of Special Flood Hazard may also include those areas known to have flooded historically or defined through standard engineering analysis by governmental agencies or private parties but not yet incorporated in the FIS.

Mayor Nix,

The Montevallo Fire and Emergency Medical Services has been experiencing a decline in volunteer participation due to the Covid-19 pandemic. With this inmind, we have less participation to the response of emergency calls. The purchase of the 3, Stryker Lucas 3.1 devices along with the Lifepak 15 cardiac monitor/AED (automated external defibrillator) have been invaluable in our response to our community. These pieces of equipment have greatly reduced the number of needed personnel from 6-8 per emergency cardiac arrest response down to 2-3, thus reducing the potential exposure to COVID-19 patients. The importance of the Lucas 3.1 mechanical CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation) device cannot be expressed enough as it does the following:

- Provides high-quality, guideline-consistent chest compressions during a sudden cardiac arrest with minimal interruptions, the LUCAS device is designed to improve CPR quality while prioritizing caregiver and patient safety.
- The American Heart Association and U.S. Department of Defense propose a role for mechanical CPR in resuscitation during the COVID-19 outbreak. In order to reduce the risk of SARS-CoV-2 transmission to caregivers, there are additional factors to consider when providing CPR:
- Manual CPR is a possible <u>transmission route for caregivers because the</u> <u>mouth and nose</u> of the personnel come close to the mouth and nose of the patient (Thus increasing Covid-19 exposure)
- During manual CPR, the operator is performing an <u>aerobic activity</u> that increases his/her minute volume and makes it more <u>likely to breathe in aerosol</u> from the patient (patient exhalation of breath including airborne virus)
- During CPR, the patient may be ventilated with an <u>airway device that is not a closed system</u> allowing exposure.
- The rotation of operators during <u>manual CPR exposes more people</u> to the disease transmission. When managing suspected and confirmed cases of COVID-19, the number of individual staff members involved in the resuscitation should be kept to a minimum with no or minimal exchange of staff for the duration of the case, if possible.

Some other key notes:

- Ability to <u>maintain distance</u> from suspected and confirmed COVID-19 patients during CPR.
- Improved caregiver safety when providing CPR during transport
- The LUCAS unit can be put on the patient with minimal staff and working in a short as 7 seconds

The importance of the Stryker Lifepak 15 cardiac monitor defibrillator in an emergency care and COVID-19 setting cannot be overstated. In the Montevallo Community this device is used by a wide range of personnel from the newest volunteer, to the most seasoned EMT/Paramedic. The clinical scope of the machine is vast, yet very easy to use even if the newest member spends only a few basic hours training on the machine he/she will be able to do the following:

- 1. Clinically capture and evaluate a STEMI (major heart attack) that is about to happen or is currently happening. The Lifepak 15 is the only cardiac monitor on the market that constantly "hunts" for this heart issue through its world class and decades proven Glasgow Algorithm. Most non trained/new personnel do not know yet how to detect this symptoms and with this technology the work is done for them.
- 2. If a STEMI is under way, a simple transmission from the LP 15 to the hospital not only ready's the emergency department, but alerts the cath lab for use so patients can receive immediate cardiac care and reversal.
- 3. In addition to the advanced diagnostic capabilities of the LP 15 it can also be used as Automated External Defibrillator by ALL personnel. The simplicity of this function allows for operation by just ONE FINGER! This GREATLY reduces the amount of personnel needed for direct patient contact during the COVID-19 pandemic, thus reducing the potential exposure of our volunteer personnel.
- 4. Since the COVID-19 Pandemic is a Respiratory Pandemic, the LP 15 brings along several important monitoring/diagnostic tools of the respiratory system such as:

A. Sp02 monitoring of oxygenation of the blood stream

- B. Waveform Capnography/EtCO2 monitoring
- C. Blood Pressure Monitoring
- D. EKG capability both 3 lead and advanced 12 lead
- E. Carbon Monoxide Poisoning (SpCO) reading.
- 5. As mentioned above the LP 15 has the capabilities of monitoring SpCO readings. This can also be a very important number of assessing firefighter wellness during a firefighting event. It is critical, especially during the overhaul portion of an active structure fire, to monitor personnel during the rehab portion to insure exposure levels are within tolerable limits to eliminate the probability of firefighter injury from CO exposure.

All of these tools are key to properly assessing and treating respiratory illness. During the COVID-19 Pandemic it is important to remain an appropriate distance from the patient which cannot be done using manual assessment methods, and the LP 15 allows all of these assessment techniques and more to be accomplished at a safe social distance away without compromising patient care.

The Lifepak 15 allows all our volunteers to place an advanced piece of equipment for the treatment of cardiac issues in the community that can be used from the newest volunteer to the most seasoned EMT/Paramedic. This equipment is less cumbersome and can be quickly carried by one individual to treat a patient and reduce exposure. These devises can be applied to the patient with limited staff and thus significantly reducing Covid-19 exposure to our volunteer personnel.

In summary, as a volunteer department, these devices along with all of the personal protective equipment like gloves, gowns, goggles, masks, sanitizers and cleaners absolutely help in the prevention and exposure of Covid-19 to our firefighters, and first responders by limiting the amount of personnel entering into a residence for evaluation and treatment and offering virus protection with personal protective equipment and sanitization on completion of each call.

OLD FIELD SUCCESSION

The Shoal Creek Park ecosystem is variously composed of grassland. oak-hickory forest, successional pine, and wetland habitats. Much of the land within the park boundary has been used for agricultural purposes for the last 193 years. The 167 acres that comprise today's Shoal Creek Park are a remnant of an original 800-acre settlement that began in 1824. During settlement, parts of the land were cleared and developed for growing cotton, orchards, vineyards, and cane. In more recent times, much of the land that now comprises Shoal Creek Park had been used to grow fodder (grasses and clovers) and for the grazing of cattle. Approximately 105 acres (63%) of park grounds are grasslands, some (ca. 59 acres) of which were still being used for cattle feeding operations at the time of the park creation. The grassland flora is rich in species of grasses, sedges, and clovers, many of which are non-natives.

Grasslands and pasturelands persist by virtue of recurring disturbances (e.g. fires, mowing, herbivore grazing) that prevent the recruitment of shrub and trees species. When left undisturbed, grasslands and pasturelands will undergo an ecological process known as succession. Succession entails a gradual transition in floral (and faunal) composition over time. It begins when seeds from adjacent woodlands (some already present in the topsoil) germinate and it proceeds through a series of stages wherein earlier-colonizing species are displaced by later-colonizing species, ultimately reaching a climax stage that will persist until being disturbed again. The rate of succession and the specific outcome depend on many factors including soil characteristics, hydrologic conditions, and proximity of seed sources.



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
