The Chief also informed the Council that officer Wilder, our Code Enforcement Officer is still out sick.

Chief Brad Davis provided the Fire Department report. He said they received 77 calls so far this month. Only two were fire calls. The majority were EMS related. He also mentioned the Fire Marshall inspected six businesses.

The City Clerk updated the Council on the recent Public Safety Committee. He said they narrowed down a potential site for a new storm shelter to the lot behind City Hall. He said the committee preferred that location because it was already owned by the city, centrally located, close to the Police Department, not in a Flood Plain, and could serve City Hall employees in the event of an aproaching storm. We estimate the cost will be between \$100,000 and \$200,000 for a 100 person shelter. We have asked our architects to draft the possible shelter onto our site plan, as well as have our electrical engineer determine whether or not our existing generator has enough power to carry the load of the shelter, as well as City Hall.

Council Member Nix reminded everyone that Arbor Day will be held at the Recycling Center this coming weekend, starting at 9 a.m.

Public Works Director Kirk Hamby noted we've received 16" of rain so far in February. He noted the weather is expected to clear for a while staring Tuesady. He also stressed that the Hwy 25 paving project is not a city project. ALDOT is doing that work, Their crews have been very professional, with the exception of their flagmen., We've received a lot of complaints about the project from people who think those are our crews.

Sustainability Coordinator Olivia Barone reported there are a lot of improvements underway at the Recycling Center. Everything looks much better. She also reported that we've collected 23 lbs. of the plastic films – plastic grocery bags, etc. Our deadline to collect 500 pounds of the films ends in a couple weeks, so there isn't any real chance of us winning the bench. Even so, we've eliminated 23 lbs. of bags from the waste stream – which is a good thing.

Shane Baugh updated the Council on progress at Parks & Rec. He said that, due to the rain, the only spring sport that has started is volleyball because it is played indoors. Travel ball starts this weekend. He also said we're working on a 7K marathon at Shoal Creek Park. He said an event like that would attract a lot of people to Montevallo.


Council Member Nix suggested Mr. Baugh be sure to notify our local restaurants and other businesses that Travel ball is starting up again. Mr. Baugh said he would.
