Work Session called to order at 5:30 p.m. by Mayor Nix.

Mayor Nix called for Discussion of New Business Items on Agenda:

Mayor Nix called for Committee Reports:

Public Health & Safety: (Police, Fire, Code Enforcement, Housing Abatement and Planning & Zoning) Mayor Nix called on Council Member King for Public Health & Safety. Council Member King called on Chief Littleton for the Police Department report. Chief Littleton reported there were 54 cases in October and 873 Total Cases year to date. See Appendix 1.

Council Member King called on Chief Davis for the Fire and EMS Department Report. Chief Davis Reported 69 Calls for the first half of October. Chief Davis reported there was a Burn Ban still in effect statewide. See Appendix 2.

Sustainability: (Streets & Sanitation, Recycling, Arbor & Beautification, ValloCycle, Environmental Preservation Initiatives, and Historical Commission) Mayor Nix called on Council Member Dukes for the Sustainability Report. Council Member Dukes reported Kirk Hamby, Head of Public Works was unable to attend and no verbal or written report. Council Member Dukes reported all is going well with the Public Works Department.

Recreation, Preservation and Community Development (Parks & Recreation, Youth Athletics, Trails, Annexations) Mayor Nix called on Council Member Eisenberg for the Recreation, Preservation and Community Development Reports. Council Member Eisenberg called on Shane Baugh, Head of Parks and Recreation. Shane reported a tournament is being held this weekend; Basketball registration will be held this week; Haunted Hay Rides will be held Saturday and Sunday this weekend at Shoal Creek Park and it's a family-friendly event.

Education, Arts & Outreach (Schools, Library, UM, Boys & Girls Club, American Village, Sister City Commission, Artwalk, IMPACT) Mayor Nix called on Council Member Mitchell for the Education, Arts and Outreach Committee Reports. Council Member Mitchell called on Marissa Wilson, Director of the Parnell Memorial Library. Marissa advised October has been great for the library – they gave out all of their pumpkins for the Pumpkin Decorating Contest; Homeschool Hub was held today with 51 in attendance; November 2nd will be their inaugural Touch-A-Truck/ Read-A-Book event; reminded everyone they are in need of snacks for their snack pantry. Sarah reported the 4th Annual Chief's Challenge will be held at Montevallo High School October 24 and invited everyone to come; Impact participated in National Night Out and it was a huge success; Sarah also gave the report for the Montevallo Junior City Council (MJCC).

Finance, Economic Development & Tourism (Finance, MDCD, IDB, Chamber, Main Street) Mayor Nix called on Council Member Swords for the Finance, Economic Development & Tourism Reports. Council Member Swords reported there will be a Finance Committee meeting this Wednesday at City Hall at 5:30 p.m. and is open to the public.

One thing have I desired of the Lord, that will I seek after; that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the Lord, and to enquire in his temple. Psalm 27:4

The Prince Hall affiliated lodge hall located at 160 Commerce Street, Montevallo, Alabama is affectionately known as the "Mason Hall." The brothers of Montevallo Star Lodge #726 purchased the property for the building in 1938 from W. M. Johnson and his wife, Nettie Johnson for one hundred dollars. It is believed that Montevallo Star Lodge was chartered between 1920-1923. It is also believed that Hobert Harris was the lodge's first Worshipful Master. The Eastern Star chapter, Harris Pride Chapter #437 was chartered in 1923. Sis. A. R. Gilmore was the first Worthy Matron and Bro. Hobert Harris, the first Worthy Patron.

The building was probably built in 1938 or shortly thereafter. It was a wooden structure until 1992 when vinyl siding was added.

Numerous improvements have been made over the years. The hall

have also service the community as a meeting place to hold different functions. It served as one of the sites students attended classes while Prentice High School was being finished between September 1949 through March 1950. It is also believed that it was one of the sites the Suburban League held meetings.

The Mason Hall was home for Montevallo Star Lodge until 2005. Boothton Pride Lodge #720 also met there. In 2005, the brothers of Montevallo Star Lodge joined Stone Mountain Lodge #187 which were meeting in Calera, Alabama at that time. Stone Mountain Lodge was chartered in 1904.

Hobert Harris ----- 1920's

Jesse Ellis Peoples ----- 1920's – 1950's

William Mayweather -- 1950's - 1960

Redgal D. DuBose ----- 1960's

Rev. Albert L. Jones ---- 1970's - 1984

Henry L. Tolbert ----- 1985 – 1990

James A. Salter ----- 1990 – 2005

A look at the impact of teachers, schools and community on black education in Montevallo

Onnie Dell Fluker drew upon personal memories of people and places in the 1920s and 1930s when in 1998, at the age of 80, she wrote "Schools for Blacks in Shelby County." Whatever else motivated her, she was determined to preserve the names of the ordinary people who went to extraordinary lengths to educate Black children during the Jim Crow era.

It rests with us to carry on her project of remembrance. A host of untold stories is in Fluker's account for additional research and imaginative retelling. This issue takes up one of them: the "Little School" in Montevallo's Jacksonville that Fluker attended as a little girl and later made her home during her long and devoted career as a public school teacher.

Onnie Dell Fluker

Let us begin by honoring Onnie Dell Fluker. She was adored by generations of students. One of her former students, Annie McClain, remembers her as half of the "dynamic duo" that shared a classroom at Almont primary school. The other half was Mary Smitherman, mother of state senator Rodger Smitherman. McClain pays tribute to the duo in an email:

"Mrs. Fluker was an intelligent, extraordinary, astonishing lady. She was beautiful on the inside and out, womanlike. Simply a precious jewel that was loved by many. She was an empathetic teacher who cared for her students. Although she taught first and second graders, her academic expectations were very high, and she made that known to the students and their parents. No student was left behind for any

reason. She ensured every student had access to the necessary supplies to excel in her classroom, even if it meant using personal funds to make it happen. Mrs. Fluker was respected by the community and her peers. She was an excellent example for the girls. She worked with them as much as possible, and as much as their young minds could comprehend about being ladies and doing what was expected as they were little girls growing up to be ladies. I guess you would call her a surrogate mother away from home. She was not there for you just academically but in every way possible. I loved Mrs. Fluker. Mary Smitherman was the same."

Mrs. Fluker occupies a special place in the memories of another Almont student, Ethel

Mae Thompson. When Ethel Mae started school she was scared to speak in front of the class. Mrs. Fluker helped her overcome her fears. She was always there to encourage and comfort: "It's all right, it's all right baby."

She is described by members of her church, Ward Chapel A.M.E. in Montevallo, as a diminutive person, soft-spoken and calm, but with a voice that commanded respect. That voice is still an object of some awe. As one recalled, "You had to lean in and listen to Ms. Fluker. She had that power."

Her nephew James Salter remembers his Aunt Dell in an email as a "very soft-spoken person and teacher who always found an opportunity to teach a lesson. . . whether it was at home, the school house, or the church house. It is why her hundreds of students loved her."

The "Little School" in Montevallo

Officially it was the Montevallo School for Negroes. The "Little School," as Fluker affectionately dubbed it, provided the only public education available for Black children in the Montevallo from its opening, probably in 1924, to 1939. It stood at the corner of Island St and the "Little Alley" (the extension of Bloch Street) in an area then known as Jacksonville. It was a two-room wooden structure, without electricity or running water and heated by a couple of pot-bellied stoves: typical of what children of color could expect at this time. It also served as a community center for Jacksonville residents, used for concerts and other events.

Fluker recalls:

"I attended the 'Little School House' in Montevallo and the 'School on the Hill' in Aldrich, Alabama. I must have been an apt child because I was sometimes promoted twice a year. It made me younger than my classmates, even in college. I was always 'too little' for the other children."


She was in fact a very short person but managed somehow to succeed at basketball in college. (Fluker, unpublished "Mini Revelations," courtesy of James Salter; interview with Rance Gaddis, Jan. 7, 2023.)

Her ties to the "Little School" go well beyond the fond memories of a precocious pupil. In the late 1940s, long after the school had closed, Fluker's parents -- O. C. and Mary Eliza Brazier Mink Cunningham -- purchased the property and converted the disused building into a family dwelling. Onnie Dell Fluker lived there for the rest of her life. The family dwelling stands still, a 9-room house on Island St across from Montevallo High School and Parnell library. At this time it is home to her grandson, Rance Gaddis, and his family. The school first appears in the minutes of the Shelby County Board of Education in 1924. It had only one teacher, Mrs. Anna Peoples. She was joined the following year by Bernice Hinton. Over the next fifteen years the "Little School" usually had two teachers. The county at this time allotted teachers of color \$40-60 a month. Mrs. Peoples, who taught the older students and acted as principal, earned \$45. Her assistants were typically paid \$40. The children served Black from school Jacksonville Evansville the to neighborhood "Cross the Creek." The nearby coal mining community of Aldrich had its own school.

Assistant teachers, usually the first teachers Black children encountered, can now be honored by name: Luvenia K. Hinton, Nannie Douglas, Buena V. Rhoden Rogers, Lillian M. Draper, Alice Johnson, and in its final year, Anna Mae Nunn. Nunn and Peoples transferred to Almont Negro Elementary School in Fall of 1939.

The layout of the "Little School" can be seen from the detail of the 1933 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map (See next page). The dwelling on the other side of the alley was

home to principal teacher Anna Peoples. She lived there with her husband Jessie Peoples, who worked as head cook at the University of Montevallo, and her daughter, Marie, still remembered today, who would also teach at Almont Elementary.

A state survey published in 1932 concluded that, "with few exceptions," schools for children of color in Shelby county were "far from satisfactory." A few schools met with approval. The County Training School in Columbiana (for secondary education) and the primary schools in Boothton, Calera, and Siluria (Alabaster) made the grade. The school in Aldrich was suitable for "temporary retention." But the Montevallo school was marked for "immediate abandonment." It had no desks, apparently, just benches, and it was unpainted both inside and out. The state wanted schools to stand on at least an acre of land, and clearly that was not the case in Montevallo. The report listed "undesirable features" found at too many of the "colored" schools, including "swamps, cemeteries, coal dumps, ditches, hog pens,

and cow pens" (66). (Report of the Survey of Shelby County Schools 1931–1932. AL Dept of Archives and History, SG 023327.)

It would be some years before abandonment of the "Little School" came to pass, but by the 40s it was "fallen in," a "shanty," a tiny space with a stage at one end, benches, and a blackboard on the wall, according to a Montevallo resident who grew up in Jacksonville. (Interview with Patricia Walker, DATE). It was still a working schoolhouse that horrible morning in April 1939 when a tornado ripped through town, destroying Shiloh Missionary Baptist on Selma Road and one other church, St Andrew's Episcopal. Kathlyn Lathion, a first-grader at the "Little School" that spring, vividly recalls the harrowing walk

home. She was carried on the back of her cousin Willie Bell as he picked his way through downed powerlines. She remembers how scared she was crossing the wooden bridge above Shoal Creek.

Jacksonville

Jacksonville. No one seems to know how it came by this name, but it brings back warm memories of an established and close-knit community, now vanished, for folks still living in Montevallo. It was just north of downtown Montevallo on both sides of Main St (in the vicinity of Jack's and the old Eclipse), nearly a mile's walk from the so-called "Negro quarters across the creek" off Selma Road. If Jacksonville could be considered the educational center of the Black community in

the 20s and 30s, Selma Road was the town's Black business and entertainment district, Montevallo's small-scale version of Beale St. It was also site of one of its earliest churches, Shiloh Baptist Missionary, and home to the Montevallo Negro High School, opened in 1950 and soon to take on its storied identity as Prentice High School.

Prentice High School was named for the activist pastor and champion of Black education, the Rev. Joseph Sydney Prentice.






When forced integration came in 1970, Prentice students were absorbed into Montevallo HS. Today the Montevallo Middle School stands at the site of Prentice High School, to this day the pride of the local Black community.

A white memoirist who came of age in Montevallo during Jim Crow days regrets that separate schools kept him from getting to know Black kids. He could remember Jacksonville, however. "In the late afternoon you could smell all sorts of good food. The only black people other than Hobby Harris and his dry cleaning business that we knew were the ones who worked in homes and others who worked in various places of business." He mentions, among others, "O. C." -- O. C. Cunningham, Onnie Dell Fluker's stepfather, "who, on the hour, rang the bell located on the corner of Reynolds Hall. There was no way to persuade him to alter the time that he kept on his big, round watch." ILLUSTRATION: Picture of O. C. and his dog Danny]. Other Jacksonville notables included Sally Prentice and her daughter Mary Jones, whom the memoirist calls "the Good Samaritan of Montevallo"; Joe Prentice, chef extraordinaire at the old St. George Hotel and son of the Rev. Joseph Prentice; and Bruce and Annie May Allen. (Robert David Ward, Time Has Made a Change in Me, 32)

Those who lived in Jacksonville experienced the joys of growing up among kinfolk and gathering for food and fun on Sunday afternoons. A grandchild of Jesse and Rachel Brazier recorded family memories in 1980. Jesse is well-known among the community elders as the A.M.E. preacher who in 1872 founded Ward Chapel A.M.E. church.

All of Grandpa Jesse's children grew up in Jacksonville, a neighborhood in Montevallo Alabama. Their children married and built their homes and reared their children there. You don't know the fun and joy of growing up with all your cousins, with your aunts having a hand in loving you and punishing you too. Aunt Mary sitting on her back porch seeing everything we kids did and reporting to our mothers if we did wrong. We had birthday parties with lemonade and ginger snaps. The children would always be in our yard. (Brazier Family Reunion, July 16, 1980)







Sunday Afternoons in Jacksonville: Mrs. Patricia Walker recalls that tables set up in the backyards of the Cunningham and McGinnis families would have been loaded with soul food: fried chicken and dressing, collard greens, black-eyed peas, macaroni and cheese, potato salad, cornbread, cake, Kool-Aid and lemonade. James Salter, a descendant of Jesse Brazier, recalls playing hide-and-seek with the Jones children, Herman Jay, Marla, and LuAnn. "We would run from one yard to the other, trying to tag each other. Those were the days!!!"

Two houses on Island Street and one on the Bloch alley are all that remain of Jacksonville, save a few precious photographs and some long memories. The other structures were all removed by the process known as eminent domain. Patricia Walker, one of the forcibly displaced, remembers Jacksonville as a Black neighborhood ringed by white homes and places of business -- including the St. George Hotel and a nearby grocery store called The Rainbow. The community felt "busy," Walker recalls, with a lot of foot and vehicle traffic in the vicinity of the Coach Company (where today the Tavern does a lively business). Her family, headed by Henry Thrift, was one of the Jacksonville families "eminent domained" in the 50s.

Starting in the late 1940s many of the homes owned or rented by Black families were "condemned" to make way for public use, first an all-white FHA project opened in 1953 and later the then all-white Montevallo 1964. School in Elementary opened Montevallo's Jacksonville is one of countless communities of color that saw its residents shoved out by eminent domain. According to research by the Institute for Justice: "Cities these communities often target condemnations, as government officials know the residents there rarely have the political clout or financial means to fight back."

Commemorating the "Little School" in Jacksonville

The all-but-forgotten "Little School" on Island Street is now the object of a Montevallobased campaign to recognize this historically significant site with a plaque sponsored by the Alabama Historical Commission and bearing the seal of the Black Heritage Council. The "Little School" has already been identified as a potential site for the Montevallo African American Heritage Trail. Funding for the Heritage Trail was approved by city council in August 2022.

The campaign to install an historical marker at the "Little School" is coordinated by the Montevallo Legacy Project, a citizen's group whose mission is preserve and educate about forgotten, little known, or untold local histories. One of its most successful ventures is the series of Untold Stories of Black Montevallo. These previously untold (or little told) stories, which interweave oral traditions and print sources, have appeared monthly since October 2022 in the Montevallo Chamber Chatter. They can be read online at TheMontevalloLegacyProject.com.

Compilation booklets featuring fifteen of the earliest Untold Stories are available at the Shelby County Museum & Archives and Montevallo's Parnell Library. A donation of \$5 is suggested.

THE "LITTLE SCHOOL" ON ISLAND STREET

In towns all over the South, the schools in Black communities were a source of pride that inspired loyalty. -- Annette Gordon-Reed, On Juneteenth

A small wooden school house for negro children once stood at the corner of Island and Bloch Streets in a Black community then known as Jacksonville. This school, nearly forgotten today, taught some of Montevallo's most admired female teachers, among them Barbara Belisle, the first African American to teach at Montevallo HS, and Kathlyn Lathion, a retired special ed teacher, recently honored as a "Hometown Hero." The "little school," as it was affectionately known, set these little girls on a path where they would become outstanding lifelong educators.

Equally deserving of admiration is Onnie Dell Fluker, a "little school" student who would go on to teach and to write a history of early Black education in Shelby County. Her nephew, James Salter, remembers his Aunt Dell as "a very soft-spoken person and teacher who always found an opportunity to teach a lesson . . . whether it was at home, the school house, or the church house. It is why her hundreds of students loved her."

This soft-spoken teacher exemplifies the fierce pride women of her generation took in their profession. After she retired in 1980, she wrote "Schools for Blacks in Shelby County," most likely because she feared this history might be forgotten. Remarkably, her account has been preserved in a folder of loose papers in the archives in Columbiana, two-and-a-half typewritten pages signed "Onnie Dell Fluker, a retired teacher." She saw to it that the story of Black schools did not go untold.

"Before and during the early twenties," she writes, "there were 'colored' schools dotted all over Shelby County. Most were held in churches. A few had school houses." Montevallo was one of the few. As early as 1924, our town was fortunate to have a two-room school house furnished with potbelly heaters and two saiaried teachers paid by the county. (They made \$40-\$45 a month.) The facility was primitive, however. "None of the early schools had running water or indoor plumbing. There were no electric lights.

The building was in such bad shape that in 1932 the state board of education marked it for "immediate abandonment."

It would continue in use through 1939, however, when an elementary school in Almont opened. Until then children from all over Montevallo, even those "across the creek," walked to the school in Jacksonville. Kathlyn Lathion remembers vividly the horrible day in April 1939 when a tornado ripped through town, destroying Shiloh Missionary Baptist on Selma Road. There were so many powerlines down she had to be carried home on the back of her cousin Willie Bell. She still recalls the fear of being carried over the wooden bridge above Shoal Creek.

After 1939, the little wooden school house fell into disuse. Long-time resident Patricia Walker, known to many today as "Miss Trish," remembers how as a curious child she played in the abandoned school house. She describes it as "fallen in," a "shanty," a tiny space with a stage at one end, benches (no desks), and a blackboard on the wall.

In the late 40s, Fluker's parents, O. C. and Mary Eliza Cunningham, were forced to sell their house on Main Street to make way for the FHA housing that opened in 1952. They bought the nearby school house property, added onto and fixed up the building, and turned it into the family dwelling. It seems fitting that for the rest of her life Fluker would make her home in the renovated school house.

The opening of the all-white Montevallo Elementary School across the street in 1964 created provocative ironies. She later reflected on her complicated feelings about integration:

Several years ago, we purchased the "Little School House" and remodeled it into a dwelling house, where we now live. In front, on a hill, sits a new formerly all-white school. I was often teased about teaching there where I could walk to school. When integration came to the county, I was invited by the Principal and the Supt. to teach there. I was also approached by several business people who suggested that I should be the one to "Cross over" there.

But she would not be the one to "cross over": "I feel that I belong with my people. I understand them and their problems" ("Mini Revelations: A Short Autobiography").

In 2011, aged 93, Onnie Dell Fluker was presented the key to the City of Montevallo, and rightly so. This soft-spoken woman, a lifelong teacher, kept alive her pride in her people and her dedication to the history of their schooling.

A CALL TO ACTION!

We are looking for citizen volunteers to help tell the story of an important historic site in Montevallo, the "little school" on Island Street. This two-room wooden schoolhouse, which opened around 1924, was the first public school for Black

children in Montevallo. It stood at the corner of Island and Bloch "alley" in a mostly Black community then known as Jacksonville. Black youngsters went to school there until 1939, when the county opened Almont Elementary School.

The schoolhouse also served as a community center for Jacksonville residents, used for meetings, concerts, and other events.

After its closure the schoolhouse fell into neglect. It got new life, however, in the late 1940s, when a Jacksonville family, forced by the city to give up their house on Main Street to make way for a public housing project, bought the property, fixed it up, and added seven rooms. It became the family dwelling first of O. C. and Mary Eliza Brazier Mink Cunningham and then their daughter Onnie Dell Fluker. Ms. Fluker had been a student at the "little school," as she affectionately called it, and she raised her son Franklin in that house. It is now occupied by her grandson, Rance Gaddis, and his family Mr.


Gaddis has expressed support for a marker that would honor his grandmother, the schoolhouse, and the vanished Jacksonville community.

So, this is our call to action. We want to see people of all ages, colors, and backgrounds working together to bring a historic marker to the site of the "little school." This could involve a number of activities, from fund-raising to awareness-raising to raising up those who learned and taught at the school nearly a century ago. One student, Kathlyn Lathion, recently celebrated her 90th birthday. She still remembers

her year at the little wooden schoolhouse. Now is the time to preserve her story and other stories about the Jacksonville community.

In fall of 2022 Mayor Rusty Nix and the city council voted to fund the proposed Montevallo African American Heritage Trail. Hurrah for that! The Trail is intended to promote awareness of the contributions of people of color to our town's history and to honor African American experience in Montevallo. At present the Trail is a glorious possibility. It will take the actions of us, the citizens, to make the dream of a Heritage Trail come true.

What better place to start than the little school in Jacksonville that in the 1920s and 1930s inspired young Black children with a passion for learning and teaching?

HOW THE "LITTLE SCHOOL" GOT BUILT

The schoolhouse that once stood at the corner of Island and Bloch is an example of black excellence and achievement that has not received its due in the Montevallo community. This Untold Story continues the story of the "little school" begun in last month's "A Call to Action!"

The building itself, constructed perhaps in the early 1920s, was modest enough. It was a two-roomed clapboard structure like other such schoolhouses, nothing fancy, just a frame structure. But -- and here the story gets interesting -- it was built to bring a public education to black youngsters. A public education. This was huge! In the previous century it was against state law to teach people of color to read and write, and now the county was paying the salaries of its black teachers.

The school was little but it belonged to a revolutionary school-building movement initiated by Chicago philanthropist Julius Rosenwald in partnership with Tuskegee's Booker T. Washington. They saw rural schoolhouses as a means to lift black children and their descendar ts out of poverty. Schools built across the rural South in the 1920s and 1930s transformed African American lives and helped give rise to the civil rights movement.

The "little school" was not a Rosenwald school but it was conceived in the Rosenwald spirit. The structure was a local community effort -- planned, funded and doubtless erected by members of the black community. True, the teachers, including lead teacher Anna Peoples, were paid by the county. But other expenses fell to the families and their neighbors and fellow church members. We see an example in nearby Wilsonville. A 1929 article in Shelby County Reporter begins: "The colored people of Wilsonville are greatly interested in a plan to build a new three-room Rosenwald school. At an enthusiastic meeting held Sunday afternoon, it was reported that nearly \$300 had been raised and placed in the bank as a building fund. The amount was raised entirely by the colored people themselves" (14 Feb., p. 1).

The late John Lewis, Alabama-born maker of good trouble, recalls his own Rosenwald school in Pike County. "The teachers' salaries were paid by the county, the only government money that came in support of our school.

Everything else . . . our families provided." He pays tribute to the "parents and neighbors who helped to raise money to build our schools and then each year continued to reach deep to purchase school supplies."

Let us now pay tribute to the black folks in Montevallo who brought the "little school" on Island Street into being and sustained its operation. Some of their descendants are still living in our town. A transaction recently uncovered in the Shelby County archives, dated Sept. 8, 1952, reveals that the school property was owned by a Trust established for "the public schools for the Colored people of the Town of Montevallo." Seven trustees are named, and the family names are still well known in the area: John Dubose, Amos Nix, A. H. Frierson, J. E. Peoples, Tom Billingsley, David Nunn, and W.M. Pitts.

They were all community leaders -- deacons in their church, officers in the local Masonic lodge -- and their names stand in for a nearly forgotten legacy of black excellence and achievement in Montevallo. 

RESOLUTION TO GRANT ACCESS TO RIGHT OF WAY TO YELLOWHAMMER NETWORKS, LLC

WHEREAS, Yellowhammer will cover the costs associated with the construction and installation of the network, and provides that the City has no financial obligations to guarantee the debt of Yellowhammer in connection with the project;

WHEREAS, the City finds a public purpose through the provision of affordable fiber-based high speed internet within its corporate limits for its residents and businesses and desires to grant non-exclusive access to the rights-of-way owned and/or controlled by the City for the purpose of building fiber-based high speed internet access to the benefit of its residents and businesses.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and the Montevallo City Council, in regular meeting duly assembled, a quorum present, as follows:

- 1. <u>Access to Right of Way Granted</u>. There is hereby granted to Yellowhammer the non-exclusive and limited authority to construct, maintain, and operate a fiber-based communications system in, over, under, across, and through the public rights-of-way in the City and any future additions or annexations thereto, as provided in the [Right of Way Access Agreement / Master Development Agreement] attached as Exhibit A.
- 2. <u>Term.</u> This right-of-way access is granted to Yellowhammer for an initial term of twenty (20) years and will automatically renew thereafter for succeeding terms of up to twenty (20) years each unless Yellowhammer or the City gives written notice to the other at least three hundred and sixty-five (365) days prior to the expiration of any term of its intention not to renew a term.
- 3. **Limitations of Right-of-Way Access.** Nothing in this Resolution shall be construed as granting to Yellowhammer an exclusive right-of-way access for the purpose set forth in this Resolution. Identical or similar right-of-way access may be granted by the City to more than one person or entity, within all or any portion of the City.
- 4. Subject to exercise of the City's police power and prior lawful occupancy of the streets. Yellowhammer shall, at all times during the life of the right-of-way access, be subject to the lawful exercise of the City's police power, and adhere to the City's laws, ordinances and such reasonable regulations as the City Council may subsequently promulgate thereunder. The City reserves the right to make reasonable rules, regulations and restrictions for the protection of persons using the streets, avenues, alleys and/or other public places in the City from injury. Any privileges prescribed by this Resolution shall be subordinate to any prior lawful occupancy of the City's rights-of-way.
- 5. <u>City-wide Access Conferred.</u> This Resolution grants access to the rights of way within the corporate limits of the City as may be amended from time to time, and the Mayor or his/her designee is authorized to execute

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the [Right of Way Access Agreement / Master Development Agreement] with Yellowhammer, substantially in the form as attached in Exhibit A.

- 6. <u>Severability</u>. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Resolution is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution. The City hereby declares that it would have passed this Resolution, and each section, subsection, clauses and phrases thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses and phrases be declared unconstitutional. Any provision found herein to be in direct contravention with state law or federal law either presently existing or enacted after the date of passage of this Resolution shall be superseded by such law and rendered unenforceable without effect to those provisions found herein that are no in contravention with state and/or federal law.
- 7. <u>Effective Date/Publication and Costs Therefor</u>. This Resolution will become effective upon publication. This Resolution shall be published by the City in accordance with the applicable provisions of Section 11-45-8 of the *Code of Alabama* (1975). All costs of publication shall be paid by Yellowhammer.
