Opportunities for Citizens to speak to the Council: Allyson Welcome of 8 Western Drive of the Aldrich Community, addressed Mayor addressed Mayor and Council to ask about houses in Aldrich that are abandoned and should be demolished. How is that process going?

T J Robertson asked about business moratorium and where the City is in the process. Mayor Nix addressed this issue.

Susan Godwin 295 Parkway Circle spoke about the Block Grant Program and asked Mayor and Council to review the information available regarding CDBG Grant Program. Please look into this before voting.

Mayor Nix called for Committee Reports:

Mayor Nix called Council Member King for Public Health & Safety: Council Member King called on Chief Littleton for the Police Department report. Chief Littleton reported there were 58 Total Calls in July and 613 Total Reports year to date. See Appendix 2.

Council Member King called on Chief Davis for the Fire Department report. Chief Davis reported there were 68 Calls for the first half of July. See Appendix 3.

Mayor Nix called on Council Member Dukes for the Sustainability Report. Council Member Dukes read report from Kirk Hamby, Head of Public Works who could not attend the meeting; two EV Charging Station and Handicapped parking spaces have been painted and striped at the City Hall Annex/ 550 Main Street City parking lot; Wadsworth Street parking project is scheduled to begin August 7th and has 45 days to be completed.

Council Member Dukes reported on ValloCycle Rides – Learn to Ride was held on June 10th and there will be two rides in August: Orientation Ride on August 20th and Glow Ride on August 24th. See Appendix 4.

Mayor Nix called on Council Member Eisenberg for the Recreation, Preservation and Community Development Reports. Council Member Eisenberg called on Shane Baugh, Head of Parks and Recreation could not attend meeting. Shane reported Youth Football begins on the 31st of the month; Orr Park restrooms are back online, and trailer will be moved to other park area to be able to remodel existing restroom built in 2003.

Mayor Nix called on Council Member Mitchell for the Education, Arts and Outreach Committee Reports. Council Member Mitchell called on Sarah Hogan, Program Director Impact Montevallo. Sarah reported Camp Journey was held last week and the students learned positive coping skills, teambuilding, and more to put them at ease about going to Middle School; she reported Maurice Valentine attended CADCA Mid-Year Training Institute last week in Dallas and has a lot of information he will be sharing in the coming weeks. Council Member Mitchell called on Kati Simmons, Junior Mayor of the Montevallo Junior City Council (MJCC). Kati reported the MJCC will be holding a recruiting event and will hold their first meeting in August.

Council Member Mitchell reported the Sister City Commission has six students and two chaperones that will be visiting Japan from July 26th – August 5th. She advised the transportation to and from the airport would be handled by Kirk Hamby, Public Works and Shane Baugh, Parks and Recreation.

Council Member Mitchell advised the Boys & Girls Club report is in Council packets. See Appendix 6.

Mayor Nix called on Council Member Swords for the Finance, Economic Development & Tourism Reports. Council Member Swords called on Courtney Bennett, Executive Director Montevallo Main Street. Courtney reported the last "Friday Nights at the Cove" will be July 28th and begins at 6:30 p.m. and features Cecil Shields, straight out of Nashville, performing tributes to the great country artists of old and invited everyone to attend; she reported the CO.STARTERS program is still accepting applications through August 15th; and seven representatives from Montevallo Main Street will be attending Main Street Alabama's Annual LAB Conference in South Huntsville August 16th – 18th and at the Awards Banquet, Main Street will be honoring Design Committee Member Karen Kelly as their Main Street Hero of the Year; and Montevallo Main Street has applied for several competitive awards and will provide an update after the conference. Triple Play – Dodgeball and basketball tournaments were held for all groups, as well as an elbow tag league, where the best taggers in each group duked it out!


Career Launch – The club had many local individuals working in various fields come out and speak to members during a career day! There were over 15 different professionals that were able to speak to members!





WHEREAS, Shelby County, Alabama has been notified by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) of eligibility as an Urban County in the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program; and,

WHEREAS, Shelby County exceeds both thresholds for Urban County qualification whereby its population exceeds 200,000 excluding metropolitan cities, and the population of unincorporated areas plus eligible participating municipalities exceeds 100,000; and,

WHEREAS, Cooperation Agreements with participating municipalities are required to consent to cooperate in providing essential CDBG activities to undertake, or assist in undertaking, community renewal and lower-income housing assistance activities in accordance with HUD requirements; and,

WHEREAS, eligible municipalities include Alabaster, Calera, Chelsea, Columbiana, Harpersville, Helena, Indian Springs Village, Montevallo, Pelham, Vincent, Westover, Wilsonville and Wilton; and,

WHEREAS, Shelby County may be funded during the three-year urban county qualification period encompassing Fiscal Years 2024-2026 to fund CDBG projects after October 1, 2024 and subsequent three-year qualification periods; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Montevallo desires to participate in the Shelby County Urban County program; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Mayor be and hereby authorized to sign the Cooperation Agreement with Shelby County to participate in the Shelby County Urban County program for Fiscal Years 2024-2026 and subsequent three-year qualification periods; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the Mayor is authorized to sign additional documentation required to complete the Urban County Qualification process as required for HUD's CDBG program.


